The Rhodo Ravine Project

The Rhododendron Ravine, encompassing the upper portion of Dominion Brook from the Reservoir adjacent to East Saanich Road to the Pond near the centre of the Park, is the true heart of the Dominion Brook Park. Nearly a century ago it held an extensive collection of rhododendrons from around the world, many of these can still be found on the ravine slopes. The restoration of the Ravine will continue to be a primary focus of the Friends of Dominion Brook Park Society.

In 2010 the consulting engineering firm, Kerr Wood Leidal, in collaboration with Joseph Daly, a Victoria Landscape Architect, was retained by The Friends of Dominion Brook Park Society to produce a rehabilitation and restoration plan for the Rhododendron Ravine. The Plan is composed of three phases. **Phase 1**, completed in the spring of 2010, includes conceptual landscape and engineering design and preliminary cost estimate for reconstruction of the Dominion Brook and Ravine. **Phase 2** includes detailed design, the completion of specifications and tender documents, and an updated cost estimate for **Phase 3**, the physical work of completing the rehabilitation and restoration of the Ravine. With **Phase 1** complete we considered the various aspects of **Phase 2** in order to determine what next steps could be taken.



Some of the tasks that need to be completed for **Phase 2** include: the completion of a detailed topographic survey; a screening level Habitat Risk Assessment; a Geotechnical Study to determine the stability of the ravine slopes and assess drainage and foundation requirements for stone retaining walls and the proposed stone bridge, and; retaining a qualified arborist to evaluate the health of affected trees in the ravine and to make recommendations regarding pruning and removal as required. Additionally, detailed drawings and construction specifications will need to be produced before construction can begin.

Since the AGM in April the Board has continued to move ahead with the restoration of the Ravine. Kerr Wood Leidal, consulting Engineers, has recently completed the Aquatic Habitat Assessment. The District of North Saanich has completed remedial work to the upper reservoir, a necessary step in regulating water flow into the Dominion Brook Ravine. As funding allows we will continue to focus on the central importance of the ravine within the park.

Thanks to the District of North Saanich for your continued support, working with the Volunteers and the Board to ensure the shared vision for the Park.





Featured Plant



SINOCALYCANTHUS chinensis

Chinese wax or sweet shrub

A genus of one deciduous species closely related to Calycanthus. In the wild, the plant is known to survive on only a few wooded mountain slopes in Zhejiang Province in Eastern China. It is a late comer to the West and a few seeds were given to UBC Botanical Gardens in the early 1980s.

The shrub grows up to 3m with glossy green leaves turning yellow in the autumn. The nodding flowers (7cm) bloom in April/June and may be creamy white to pinkish white with maroon markings at the base.

It is a rather elegantly quiet shrub with easy to grow conditions as long as it does not dry out.

Board Members meet monthly to review our financial situation, prioritize projects and discuss fund raising strategies, which are especially important as we proceed with the Rhododendron Ravine Restoration. Laughter is a common occurrence at these meetings!
