He was also a recognized conifer specialist and listed in many North American texts. # In Memoriam

JOHN DAWSON - 1930-2014



We have lost our first and most ardent supporter of the Friends of Dominion Brook Park. It was he, with his late wife, Katie, and a small group of Peninsula citizens, who began the journey to save and restore this historic botanical Park.

Over the years, John has participated in all aspect of restoration and maintenance with hours spent on mission statements, five year plans, seeking grants and guidance for those who came later to this on-

going project. This included frequent lessons on how to roll a hose properly!

We have selected a Pinus nigra (Austrian or Black Pine) to commemorate John and his dedication to Dominion Brook Park. The Pine was selected because walking by a nursery specimen my first thought was John Dawson - it is stately, upright, with handsome highlights and just a wee bit prickly. A few days before his death, I was able to tell him of the choice. A description of the tree reads: 'a tree of strong character' which is so entirely appropriate for John.

It is a sad farewell to a good friend but with many wonderful memories. Not the least being his potent pear wine generously shared at the annual volunteer pizza party.

# Pinus Nigra

A fast growing, coniferous, evergreen pyramidal tree when young, becoming flat topped when mature. It occurs across southern Mediterranean Europe from Spain to the eastern Mediterranean, on Anatolian peninsula of Turkey and on Corsica/Cyprus, including Crimea and in the high mountains of the Maghreb in North Africa.

It was first introduced to the Americas in 1759. It is well suited to landscape planting as it appears resistant to urban pollution. It is moderately fast growing, likes full sun, moist well drained soil but will tolerate dry conditions and can live up to 500 years. Possible height up to 40 feet with dark green needles of dense habit (it has wonderful pale highlights which look like lit candles as new growth) and dark furrowed bark especially attractive in older trees which makes for a very special ornamental or specimen tree.
